Our learning

Literacy

We have been working hard to use our phonics skills in full sentences. We have been looking at a videos called "Poppies" which is based on a rabbit in the poppy field during the war. We are looking forward to writing some Christmas stories using our phonics skills.

Humanities

This half term we will be learning about Guy Fawkes and the gunpowder plot. The children will be sequencing the events and using drama to explore how Guy Fawkes felt at the time of the plot.

Learning 4 Life

In these lessons we have been focusing on appropriate ways to behave in different situations and how we can manage our emotions in different ways. This week, we looked at ways to show respect and care for others and embrace our uniqueness as part of anti-bullying week.

Phonics

The children are well established in their groups for this half term now. In year 1 we are starting to look at our set 2 and 3 special friends and practising reading these speedily.

Science

We have learnt how the weather changes throughout the different seasons and how trees change throughout the year. This half term we will be learning about different materials.

Maths

The children have been working incredibly hard in maths. They have learnt part/whole models, subtraction equations and subtracting by crossing out. We have just started to use number lines to find answers to subtraction equations.

Music

This half term we will be learning about tempo. We will learn how we can use our body and voice to match the tempo of different pieces of music.

R.E.

This half term we will be learning about who God is and how please picture time. We will be spending time looking at a range of religious books and stories based on who god is. We will end this half term by looking at the nativity story.

Literacy:

In Literacy we are getting ready and excited for Christmas. Yes, you heard it right - we are already preparing. We have learnt how to write a postcard back home about current events in our unit based on Meerkat Christmas.

Science:

This half term we have continued our topic on materials. We are investigating different properties and functions.

R.E.

We have been learning about what candles represent in a range of religions and how these are used in different festivals.

Phonics

The children are well established in their groups for this half term now. In year 2 we have a huge focus on speeding up word reading. By reading quickly by sight (without using Fred talk) we will be able to increase our reading speed and develop a deeper understanding of what we are reading.

Maths:

We had continued our focus on multiplication and division facts and how these are related to each other. To support us, we have used resources and pictorial representations.

Humanities:

We have begun to explore what Remembrance is and how it helps us to remember events of the past.

Spanish

We are currently learning to sing nursery rhymes in Spanish. The children are loving this!

Music:

In Music we are looking at what an orchestra is made up of and trying to identify different instruments in compositions.
