






Literacy

We have been exploring a short film called Fantastic Flying Books and using this as inspiration for our writing. In our lessons this week we have explored the different ways to use parenthesis and repetition for effect to add more detail to our writing.



Science

This half term we are looking at animals including humans, with a focus on the human life cycle. We are also looking at how humans change as they grow up. We have started by looking at the different parts of the human timeline and will now be looking at each stage more closely. We will be carrying out an experiment to measure how we have grown over time and use our math's skills to create graphs to show our results.

Maths

Our current Maths learning is looking at the different units that we use for measure, when we would use the different units and how to convert between them.

R.E.

Our question for this half term is - Are you inspired? We have started to explore what it means to be inspired and thought about who inspires us in different ways. We will be thinking about what inspires some people to speak out about injustices that they see.

Humanities

Our humanities focus this half term is Black British History. We have started by looking at the first roles that Black people have had in our history. This week we were looking at John Blanke, who was a trumpeter for Henry the VII and Henry VIII. We used different sources of information to learn about the role that he had in the royal court.

Literacy

For two weeks in Literacy, we have been learning about explanation texts. The children have read and analysed three different explanation text pieces on: exercise, the digestive system and the circulatory system. This week, the children have been learning about the heart and how it works, they have been able to use their prior knowledge from Year 5 Science to aid their understanding and work. Also, they conducted independent research on the circulatory system, which will enable them to create a well-constructed and neat double page spread on the topic. In the next coming weeks, the children will write their own explanation texts for their independent write.













Maths

Mrs Glover's group have been focusing on data and statistics. We have learnt how to read bar charts, line graphs and pictograms. We have also answered questions about the data. We are now going on to learn about negative numbers and general revision of all our topics over the next couple of weeks.

In Miss Reilly-Wheeler's group, our topic has been Geometry and we have moved onto Position and Movement. The children have been learning how to read coordinates, describe position on a coordinate grid, translate and reflect different shapes on a grid. Next week, they will be describing the movement and then using algebra to describe different positions. Our next topic will be on Graphs and Averages.

Humanities

Last week, we came to the end of our Geography unit: Mountains. The children took on the role as explores and using Oddizzi, they trekked to Mount Everest Base Camp! The children loved this activity. Our next History unit is: Black and British. Check out the Humanities knowledge organiser to see what the children will be learning about.









Art

We have started Art this term and the children are focusing on Architecture. So far, the children done observational drawings of different houses, as well as tried to recreate some of Zaha Hadid's designs.










Science






